## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Forgive me if I have told this story before, but it is one of my favorites. One of my seminary professors relayed a story of a time when his children were little, and they were having a family meeting. He and his wife were explaining to their children what Lent was, and explaining that a traditional Lenten exercise was to give up something you enjoy for Lent. The older daughter said she would give up caffeinated drinks, like CocaCola and Pepsi. The other daughter said she would give up chocolate. The son, who was the youngest child, (at this time he was about 5 or 6 years old) said: "I will give up kicking people." The father explained: "No son, that's not what Lent is about. You need to give up something you like," The son, of course, replied: "But I LIKE kicking people!". Well...okay....watch out come Easter Sunday!

The Lenten tradition of giving up something for Lent is a good idea. I know many friends and family members who have given things up like smoking, fast food, Facebook, and other vices for Lent. The tradition comes from the knowledge that before Jesus began his ministry, he spent 40 days and 40 nights in the wilderness, fasting and praying; the end of which he was tempted by the devil.

Lately, it has become increasingly popular to put a bit of a twist on the idea of a Lenten discipline: instead of giving something up for Lent, begin a new spiritual practice. Examples could be setting time every day to read a Bible text, setting aside a certain time each day for prayer, or fasting once a week. For anyone wondering how fasting would work, they might try emulating how Muslims fast during the month of Ramadan. In the month of Ramadan, Muslims fast between sunup and sundown, so they are allowed to eat before the sun comes up in the morning, then again in the evening, with only water and vitamin supplements during the day.

During March, on the five Sundays in Lent (March 1, $8,15,22$, and 29) we will be having a mid-week Lenten dinner at 6 p.m. followed by a worship service at 7PM. Four of the services will be the Holden Evening Prayer Service. The service on May 22 will be a contemporary worship service in Rice Hall. The theme of each service will be one of the five promises that we make at our baptism. Or, if we were baptized as infants, the five promises made on our behalf, which we affirm for ourselves when we are confirmed.

If we have fallen away from one or more of these promises, Lent is a perfect time to remind us to honor those promises again-repent of our inaction, and willfully choose to live into our baptismal promises. Of course, it is important to remember that the reason for engaging in these practices; the reason for living into our baptismal promises is not so that we can be saved; it is because we already are saved. Paul calls it dying to sin and rising to new life in Christ.

The Gospel acclamation we sing during the Lenten season perfectly sums up our Lenten discipline, returning to living out our baptismal promises. It comes from the prophet Joel; the $2^{\text {nd }}$ chapter, $13^{\text {th }}$ verse: Return to the Lord your God, for He is gracious and merciful; slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. In the abiding hope of the empty tomb,

The word "Lent" comes from the old English word lencten. This season begins with Ash Wednesday, and runs for 40 days, until Easter. The tradition of placing ashes on the forehead on Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of a season of solemnity and reflection on Christ's suffering for our sins. Holy Week occurs the week prior to Easter, starting with Palm Sunday and ending with Good Friday.

Colors of Lent and Easter: The colors for Lent are purple, to remind us of our need for repentance. For Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, black is used to remind us of our sorrow at our Savior's suffering. On Easter, the colors are white or gold, the color of purity, holiness, glory, and joy for our Savior's resurrection and triumph on the cross.


Holy Week recalls the events of the week that led up to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Over the years, this week has been considered the most important and holy time in the life of the church-especially what is known as the "Triduum" - or Great Three Days - of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter morning.

When he came to the gate of the town, a widow was there gathering sticks; he called to her and said, 'Bring me a little water in a vessel, so that I may drink.' ${ }^{11}$ As she was going to bring it, he called to her and said, 'Bring me a morsel of bread in your hand.' 12But she said, 'As the LORD your God lives, I have nothing baked, only a handful of meal in a jar, and a little oil in a jug; I am now gathering a couple of sticks, so that I may go home and prepare it for myself and my son, that we may eat it, and die.' 13Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. 14For thus says the LORD the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the LORD sends rain on the earth.' 15 She went and did as Elijah said, so that she as well as he and her household ate for many days. 16The jar of meal was not emptied, neither did the jug of oil fail, according to the word of the LORD that he spoke by Elijah. (1st Kings 17:10-16; NRSV) In this passage Elijah encounters a widow who is in the midst of a personal and a national economic crisis. However when she invests her resources, time and culinary talent in sustaining Elijah, God sustains her in return.
Let this scripture encourage us to keep our stewardship commitment of giving our resources and ourselves to Christ. For the same grace that sustained this widow is still available to sustain us as well.
